Sierra Fly Fishing, vol. 1: Halflight Productions, 2006

The following excerpts are taken from a review by Jerrold Paul Shelton from the June 2007 issue of California Fly Fisher Magazine.

"It pains me to admit this, but most fly-fishing videos leave me unimpressed and uninspired. I can tolerate only so much 'Here I am again with yet another really big fish' before I start yawning uncontrollably and nod off to dream of more pleasant things — like root canals or barium enemas. It most cases, the typical fly-fishing DVD amounts to little more than watching someone else catch fish, which isn't as much



fun as catching them and is about as interesting to me as watching paint dry. Sierra Fly Fishing, vol. 1: The Lower Kern River, however, isn't like that all. It succeeds handsomely in creating the illusion that you are a part of the action in real time, rather than the after-the-fact witness to it that you really are as a viewer. ...

In this DVD, [producer/director/cinematographer Tysun] McMullan has done something that is easy to conceptualize, but very difficult actually to do, and that is to deliver the essence of what fishing a particular body of water is all about. As I noted, the cinematography credit also goes to McMullan, and 'exquisite' is a fitting adjective with which to describe much of the camera work this DVD contains. ..."



Order To Stop Stocking Kern With Rainbow Trout

With a Nov. 24 court order that would end stocking the Kern River with non-native rainbow trout, more than 50 people packed into the Kernville Chamber Community Building for the Kern River Valley Revitalization (KRVR) December meeting Dec. 3.

Fish Stocking to Cease in Kern River by Court Order

Guest speaker Christy McGuire, Fishery Biologist with the Department of Fish and Game (DFG), gave a presentation about the recent court order to stop stocking the Kern River with non-native rainbow trout. Isabella reservoir will not be affected by the ruling, which was given on Nov. 24, after the Center for Biological Diversity and Pacific Rivers Council filed a lawsuit against stocking non-native fish in all California rivers that contain one or more of the 25 threatened or endangered species listed in the suit. McGuire explained that there is one species of concern in the Kern River, the hardhead minnow, but it has a thriving population here despite the stocking of non-native fish for over 70 years. The DFG is currently preparing an Environmental Impact Report (EIR) to show biological evidence that the hardhead minnow is not in danger from stocking. "There is no biological reason to stop stocking the rainbow trout," said McGuire. "I'm here to express the Department's interest in working with community leaders and members to get our river back."

Guy Jeans, owner of Southern Sierra Flyfishing in Kernville, makes his entire living from guiding fishing trips on the Kern River. However, Jeans believes that the court order is not a death sentence for trout fishing. He suggested that the Fish Hatchery begin stocking only native rainbow trout, which is acceptable in the suit. Former Hatchery Manager Greg Kollenborn explained that the shift to native trout is already in the works, but will take 3-5 years before catchable fish are produced.

KRVR President Joe Ciriello passed around a signup sheet to start a committee on this issue so that the Kern Valley can present the information to the plaintiffs with one voice. "It's time again to rally around our hatchery and river to get this minnow issue resolved," said Jim Hunt, President of Friends of the Hatchery.

Gary Lafontaine's Legacy

The late Gary LaFontaine was one of the most innovative fly tiers of our time. His unique creations were the result of meticulous observations, both above and below the water's surface, of the appearance and behavior of the creatures that trout eat. Careful observation and a highly imaginative hand at the vise led to some of the most productive flies ever created and his books are, ad will remain, standards on the fly tier's bookshelf.

Al and Gretchen Beatty were long-time friends of Gary and collaborated with him on a number of projects. Here they present Gary's final legacy, twenty-six patterns that have never before been published.

Trout Flies For The 21st Century

I'm sure that Dick Talleur requires no introduction here; his many fly tying books and innumerable articles in national magazines have made him one of the world's best-known writers on fly tying. The flies featured in this book represent a selection of the best from the past and some of the most effective contemporary patterns; a compendium of flies that should outfit the angler for nearly any situation at almost any place.

Before delving into the patterns, the author has penned an interesting and detailed discussion of that most important of fly tying materials; the hackle.

As you can guess these treatments are a little tiring but on the whole not so bad as you might think. I'm in pretty good spirits, experiencing no real difficulties (except for a radical change in my sense of smell and in my taste buds which makes a lot of food taste just awful—but this will pass as the weeks go on). I just try to live each day as best I can and to be thankful for all that is good in my life.

Hundreds of emails, get-well cards, and telephone calls have come in within the past few weeks, from all over the world.... I appreciate your thoughts and concern much more than you can know, than I can tell. It means the world to me to know that people care; they really do. And I do, too. God bless you all.

As I said at the beginning of the newsletter, I'm going to carry on as best I can while going through treatments, with my life and with my business. I'll continue to tie flies, put together framed items, write books, sign them, etc., etc., etc., but the pace will necessarily be slower for a month or so since I tire fairly easily.



We will have a Saturday Fly Tying Session on January 10th from 9 - 12 at the club's classroom, 145 B Panamint. We will be tying the Klinkhammer Special an emerger pattern. This pattern from Dutch tier Hans van Klinken has become popular with American fly anglers, such as our own Steve Garrison. The thread, abdomen, and hackle colors can be changed to match this fly to specific insects, but a light-colored pattern and a dark one in a few different sizes can see you through a lot of hatches.
